From Dean Osburn's Desk

As the school year winds down and you prepare for your summer activities, the faculty have initiated an Academic Planning process. We are undertaking this process to better determine the type of training we need to focus on as we prepare future graduates for the diverse career opportunities available to veterinarians in service to society. This is being done at the very time that the School is in the midst of a construction program that will permit us to increase the size of our classes. The increased student numbers will leverage more faculty members and this will help us to address the many the broad array of opportunities for our future graduates.

The topics that we are discussing include the future of: small animal practice – solo vs. group or corporate practices; food animal practice; specialty practices; ecosystem health practice; veterinary public practice (public health); and graduate education leading to careers in academic and research institutions. Faculty are hearing from experts in these fields who have shared their perspectives on the future directions in their respective fields, the background training needed to for future veterinarians, and the needs for veterinarians in these different fields. The information obtained from these discussions will be used by the faculty as they review the school's curriculum and determine what changes need to be made to prepare our future graduates.



In the fall, we plan to hold seminars for faculty that emphasize adult learning and teaching technologies and approaches that facilitate learning. We will also consider the types of clinical instruction and experiences that students should receive. Decisions will be made on what is the core information that all students need to know, and what should be elective or left to post-graduate training. The new instructional facilities will bring all faculty and students closer to the VMTH and the clinical programs. This will facilitate more case-based instruction and an increase in the problem-solving opportunities for students.

The School is happy to announce that we have just received and additional \$6.3 million for student

scholarships. This endowed gift will be invested to generate annual scholarship support in perpetuity. This very welcome gift came from a grateful pet and horse owner in Reno. Their local veterinarian, Dr. Jack Walther, the immediate past- President of the AVMA and a UC Davis graduate, encouraged them to assist students by leaving their estate to the School. We are fortunate to have thoughtful alumni who are there to assist the School and our students.

On behalf of all of the faculty and staff, we wish all of you an enjoyable summer. In particular, we wish the new graduates an exciting and profitable career, and those entering the clinical year the excitement of applying your basic knowledge to clinical cases.

Adrienne is originally from Los Angeles, CA and bravely moved to College Station, TX to get a degree in Biomedical Science from Texas A&M University. After working a few years in biotech at Genentech, she went back and got a Master's degree in Neurophysiology. Her life took a turn for the better when she discovered the beauty of things that could eat her, namely Great White sharks. She went on a couple of dives to see these massive creatures outside of San Francisco at the Farrallones Islands. It was there (in her first year of vet school, no less) that she had the idea to take part of the money generated by this "ecotourism" (by general rule of thumb, everyone on these dives has at least one shark tattoo as proof they really, really like sharks) and use it to help research the sharks. Through all this, she has travelled to Guadalupe, Mexico on dives and more in the Farrallones trying to perfect the way to take muscle biopsies and draw blood on wild, live, non-sedated Great White sharks. These feasibility studies are now a few years in the making and soon hopes to get outside funding to expand the project. Her after-school plans are still in the works, but right now are focused on finishing her last year of school and her research.

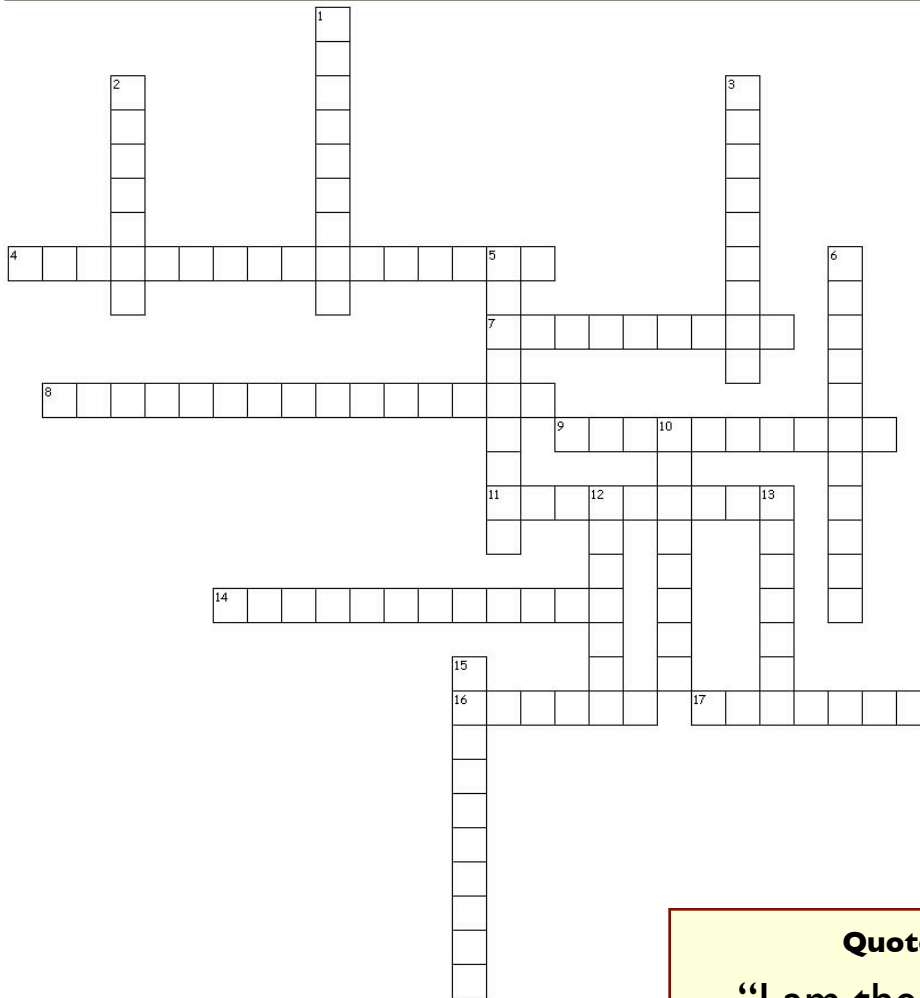
**Ryan Garcia
