- POSITION AVAILABLE:** Assistant/Associate Professor of Clinical Anatomic Pathology
- SALARY:** Dependent on qualifications and experience

- QUALIFICATIONS:** Veterinarian with advanced training in anatomic pathology. Board certification in the American College of Veterinary Pathologists or European College of Veterinary Pathologists is required, and a PhD is preferred. Clinical experience and competence in anatomic pathology required, expertise in companion avian, exotic pet, zoo animal, and wildlife pathology preferred. Training and experience in clinical research in anatomic pathology required, and in companion avian, exotic pet, zoo animal, and wildlife pathology preferred. Documented record of creative scholarship or potential to develop an independent clinical research program in anatomic pathology required. Demonstrated aptitude/experience in teaching, particularly clinical instruction, required. Must possess excellent interpersonal and communication skills and a demonstrated ability to work with others in a collegial team atmosphere.
- RESPONSIBILITIES:**
- Clinical: The position includes a 70% clinical commitment to the Anatomic Pathology Service of the Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital (VMTH). Individual will be responsible for directing, instructing and supervising veterinary students and residents; providing diagnostic service to clients and clinicians; and advising and consulting with referring veterinarians and clients, particularly for non-domestic animal cases.
- Teaching: The primary teaching responsibility will be direct daily supervision and instruction of senior students in anatomic pathology. Other responsibilities include: 1) course leader for Comparative Pathology of Non-Mammalian Vertebrates and Zoo Pathology Rounds; 2) participation in lectures and laboratories in the DVM professional curriculum; 3) clinical teaching in the Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital (VMTH); and 4) participation in the graduate clinical (resident) training program of the VMTH.
- Professional Competence: Advance the discipline within the VMTH, as well as locally and nationally, through participation and leadership in providing prompt, specific and specialized diagnosis in the hospital environment. Expected to establish reputation for clinical excellence locally, regionally and nationally, depending upon level of appointment. Must demonstrate clinical competence and be recognized for accomplishment in a focused area of zoo or wildlife pathology.
- Creative Scholarship: Faculty is expected to advance the clinical discipline through creation and dissemination of new knowledge with documentation in peer-reviewed publications. Creative/scholarly activities are required for individuals in this series, but in view of the responsibilities for clinical service and teaching, the type of scholarly activity may focus on integrating/improving clinical care, conducting clinical research studies, and/or improving veterinary medical education.
- Service: University and public service through committee work, participation in professional organizations, continuing education and other appropriate means is required.
