

## DRIVING DIRECTIONS:

### From Sacramento:

Take I-80 WEST toward San Francisco and continue approximately 15 miles. Take exit Highway 113 North (to Woodland). Continue with directions below.

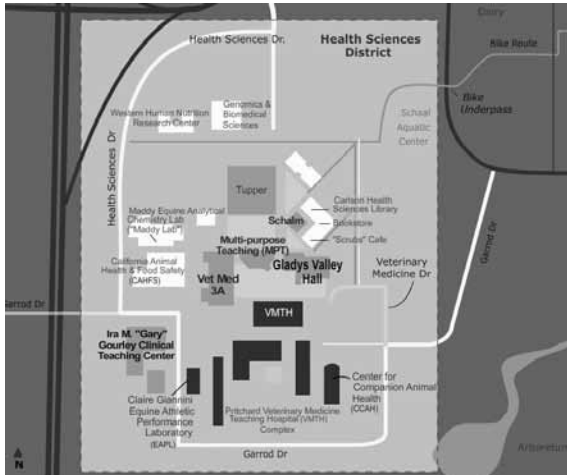
### From San Francisco:

Take I-80 EAST toward Sacramento. Exit at Highway 113 North (to Woodland).

### From Highway 113:

Take the first exit (Hutchison Drive) and bear RIGHT (east) on Hutchison. Take the second right onto LaRue Road (4-way light) and continue until you reach a curve in the road. At curve, turn RIGHT onto Garrod Drive and follow road to stop sign. Turn right onto Veterinary Medicine Drive, which winds around Parking Lot 50. Turn left into Parking Lot 50. Additional parking is also available next to the Center for Companion Animal Health (CCAH) in Parking Lot 55. Please do not park in any of the spaces marked for patients of the Small Animal Clinic.

## Scott Morrison, DVM

Dr. Scott Morrison grew up riding hunters and jumpers in New York. After high school, he attended horseshoeing school at Danny Ward's Eastern School of Farriery. He put himself through undergraduate school at Virginia Tech and veterinary school at Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine by shoeing horses. In 1999, he was hired by Rood and Riddle Equine Hospital in Lexington to do ambulatory work with an emphasis in equine podiatry. As the podiatry caseload increased, Rood and Riddle built a podiatry center that is staffed by four veterinarians, two full-time technicians and three full-time farriers. Currently, his caseload is 100% podiatry.

## Rodney King, NZCEF, CJF

Rodney King was born and raised in New Zealand. He was introduced to horses in his early twenties and quickly developed a passion for eventing, show jumping and fox hunting. He discovered horseshoeing when he attended a short course to learn how to shoe his own horses because of a lack of farriers in the area. He went on to gain his New Zealand Farriery Certification (NZCEF) and ran a successful shoeing business in North Canterbury before joining Rood and Riddle. He gained his CJF certification in the United States in 2006 and has received numerous scholarships and awards within the farrier industry. At Rood and Riddle, he works alongside Dr. Morrison and his team in therapeutic, remedial and performance shoeing with various foot conditions.
