

## **Jerrold Tannenbaum, JD**

Jerrold Tannenbaum is Professor Emeritus at the UC Davis School of Veterinary Medicine, where he taught the required courses in veterinary law and ethics from 1999 to 2013. He taught these subjects for seventeen years at Tufts University School of Veterinary Medicine, where he established that school's signature program in Ethics and Values. At Davis, he also taught an undergraduate course in animal ethics for animal science and biology students for eight years, and from 2003 to 2015 taught animal law at the UC Davis School of Law. Mr. Tannenbaum did his undergraduate work in philosophy at Cornell University and graduate work in philosophy at The Rockefeller University and Cornell. He was an Assistant Professor of philosophy at the University of California at Santa Barbara. He is a graduate of Harvard Law School and was an Assistant District Attorney in New York County (Manhattan).
