The Center for Equine Health has access to the largest group of equine specialists and researchers available anywhere. Their expertise spans the breadth of clinical and basic science disciplines that apply to the horse. Although all health and performance problems qualify for study, the CEH has 11 current areas of research priority:

- Diagnostic imaging
- Orthopedics and lameness
- Athletic performance limitations
- Neonatology and foal diseases
- Advancement in surgical techniques
- Reproduction
- Colic prevention and treatment
- Clinical pharmacology and anesthesia
- Equine infectious diseases
- Genetics
- Biohazards to the equine industry



CEH in education . . .

The findings of studies conducted by CEH researchers are applied within the Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital so that continuous improvements can be made in the standard of veterinary care provided to equine patients. In addition, the Center for Equine Health plays an important role in the training of future veterinarians, academic clinicians, and researchers by providing invaluable hands-on learning opportunities to undergraduate veterinary students, residents and graduate students. Other educational contributions include:

- Seminars and other public outreach programs
- Publications, including an award-winning quarterly newsletter (*The Horse Report*)
- An annual report on the latest research studies
- A Web site (www.vetmed.ucdavis.edu/ceh) geared to helping horse owners find information on a variety of health issues, from vaccinations to genetic testing

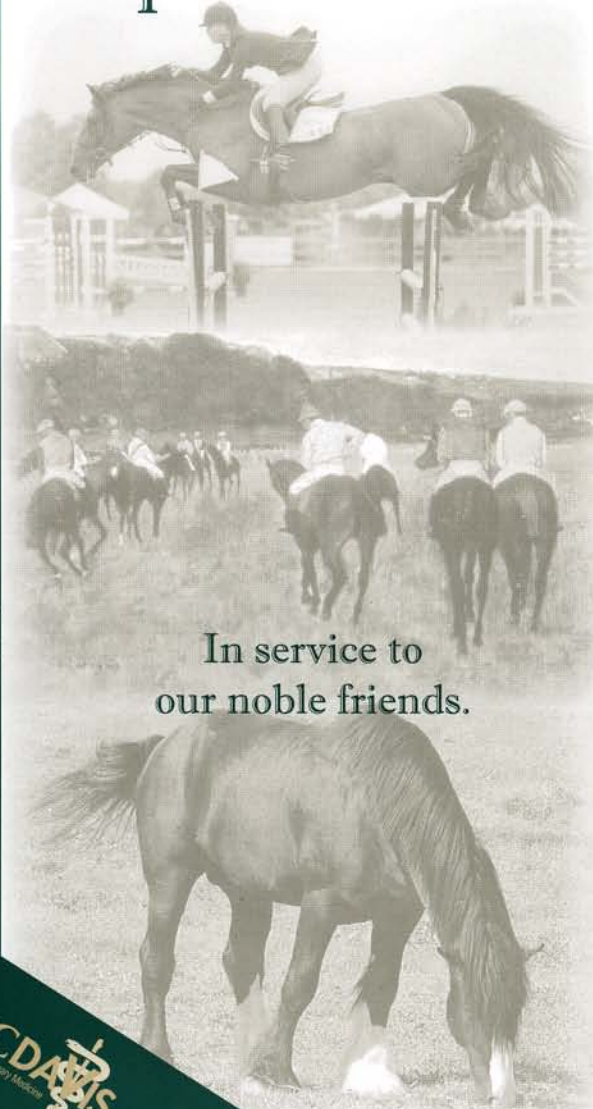

For over three decades, the **Center for Equine Health (CEH)** has been the primary means through which the UC Davis School of Veterinary Medicine has advanced the health, well-being, and veterinary care of horses. The CEH has become internationally recognized for its leadership in equine medical research and education. Over the years, many advancements have been made in equine health care, hundreds of new equine veterinarians have been trained, and thousands of horse enthusiasts have benefited from the programmatic activities of the CEH.

How we function . . .

The CEH provides laboratory facilities and serves as an operational umbrella under which more than 70 scientists conduct their equine medical research. Dr. Gregory L. Ferraro, Director, oversees the 113-acre research facility and manages its many ongoing



research programs and educational activities. He and his staff provide support to research scientists and educators and develop educational programs for both veterinary professionals

and the public. They regularly publish a variety of periodicals on equine health topics, including their award-winning quarterly **The Horse Report**.

Where our support comes from . . .

Past and current University of California budgets do not include allocations for equine research and

public education. As such, all of the activities of the CEH must be financed from public and private donations. The California racing industry has supported the CEH through contributions from annual racing simulcast revenues and through direct donations from racing associations. However, the bulk of its annual revenues come from horse owners and enthusiasts like you. Individuals, public and private foundations, and concerned citizens who want to protect and maintain equine health and welfare are our lifeblood.
