  - 5. Were or currently are eligible for Federal Pell grants (Definition: <a href="https://www2.ed.gov/programs/fpg/eligibility.html">https://www2.ed.gov/programs/fpg/eligibility.html</a>);
  - 6. Received support from the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) as a parent or child (Definition: <a href="https://www.fns.usda.gov/wic/wic-eligibility-requirements">https://www.fns.usda.gov/wic/wic-eligibility-requirements</a>).
  - 7. Grew up in one of the following areas: a) a U.S. rural area, as designated by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) Rural Health Grants Eligibility Analyzer (<a href="https://data.hrsa.gov/tools/rural-health">https://data.hrsa.gov/tools/rural-health</a>), or b) a Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services-designated Low-Income and Health Professional Shortage Areas (qualifying zipcodes are included in the file). Only one of the two possibilities in #7 can be used as a criterion for the disadvantaged background definition.

Students from low socioeconomic (SES) status backgrounds have been shown to obtain bachelor's and advanced degrees at significantly lower rates than students from middle and high SES groups
